Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury, a church-related, continuing care community, has a rich past full of faith, tenacity, and perseverance. This year RWC celebrates 35 years of service. We continue our commitment to providing the highest quality living experience for senior adults in the Northern Neck-Middle Peninsula area. RWC was a dream of Mr. W. Garland Clarke, Capt. Thomas Denegre, Jr., Mr. W. Henry Edwards, and The Rev. Robert Sheeran. In the early eighties, these men, along with The Rev. Henry Lown, Mr. Richard Weber, Mr. Wellford Sanders and Mr. Douglas D. Monroe, Jr. started a group called The Rappahannock Retirement Associates as a steering committee. This committee, in association with Westminster Presbyterian Homes and Virginia Diocesan Homes, formed a Board of Trustees to develop the idea of Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury. Over \$500,000 in gifts and pledges were raised to support the formation of the continuing care community. After much perseverance, Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury was dedicated September 7, 1985. Its first president was Rexford Beckwith, III and its first resident was Mr. Leonard Carlton.

Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury opened its doors with cottages, a small health center area, and an apartment building. With the aid of additional sponsorships and donations from donors like you, RWC has grown from a 113-acre facility to 165 acres and added 46 free-standing homes and a state-of-the-art fitness facility. Outreach programs extend essential services to the greater community such as At Home with RWC, the Parkinson's Support Group and Memory Support Groups.

RWC is a welcoming neighborhood and a partner to the greater community. Our journey is filled with compassionate, creative solutions to aid a much deserving family community. Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury is proud to be home to compassionate staff committed to residents, clients, and families of today and the future. We would not be where we are today without them or supporters like you.

New Life Enrichment Center Includes a Fitness and Aquatics Center

Adjacent to the Chesapeake Center on the RWC campus at 132 Lancaster Drive, Irvington, the new center includes a fitness area with exercise equipment, a yoga room, locker rooms and classrooms. The heated aquatics area features a 75-foot lap pool with three swim lanes, a wheelchair ramp and a large exercise area for water aerobics and other exercise programs. The resident life and arts classrooms provide ample space for a variety of activities including an amateur radio station and a woodworking shop.

Currently 80% of RWC residents participate in some form of wellness activities. More than 20 fitness classes are held on-site each week, as well as special programs to serve the needs of those with Parkinson's and their caregivers. RWC is known nationally for its high wellness participation rate among residents and has been recognized by the International Council on Active Aging for its Mind & Muscle speaker series.









At Home with RWC

n 2017, Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury noticed a growing need for those individuals who wanted to age in place. RWC developed *At Home with RWC*, a fee for service program, which provides individuals on campus and in the community exceptional care in their own homes. Nurses assist with such activities such as bathing, grooming, dressing, mobility, medication reminders, transportation, housework and more.

Macular Degeneration Support

The Macular Degeneration Support Group debuted September of 2019 and has about 12 attending. The group was started from a resident request for support of those who are suffering from the disease.

Community Outreach Parkinson Support

Rounded its *Parkinson Support Group* in 2003, following a request of Carl and Patricia Morris, who saw the need for assistance in this area. Kori Poplin and Patricia Nystrom coordinated the program. Mrs. Rita DePew has since taken the mantle as volunteer leader of the group. Included in the program are members of the local community who join our residents in an array of activities which include the *Fit to Move* program and the *Care Partner Group*. The group of members, which include caregivers and their spouses, has grown to about 100 people.

Memory and Caregiver Support

Since Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury cares about the needs of its residents a Dementia Care Consultant was chosen and Memory Support Groups were initiated.

RWC chose Mary Arthur to become a Dementia Care Consultant. The Health Services Administrator at the time saw Mary interacting with those with dementia. She noted the kindness and the compassion that Mary Arthur



exuded for those with Dementia. Mary Arthur remembers:

"I worked at the Health Center desk, and we had a resident who worked for the phone company for years and she had Alzheimer's. She would often try to answer our phones, and I set up a desk for her with a phone, notepad, and pen. She would stay engaged there and after that, Mary Estes asked if I would like to attend a Teepa Snow training and I was thrilled. I became a Certified Dementia Care Trainer and then a Certified Dementia Care Practitioner. A couple of years later, I became a Dementia Care Consultant."

Mary works very hard each day to make residents she engages with are cared for as it they were her grandmother.

RWC also recognized the need for caregivers of those with Dementia to interact with others like themselves, so the *Memory Support Group* was developed. The *Memory Support Group* started on October 3, 2016 in partnership with the Alzheimer's Association with Ellie Galloway as its initial facilitator. Amy Lewis became facilitator about six months later. It quickly grew from about 6 or 8 people to about 30 participants. In 2017, Mary Arthur and Amy Lewis realized that caregivers have difficulty attending support groups because their loved one is left alone with no one to care for them, so they started three support groups in one in to address care-giving issues.

The Caregiver Support Group, the Early Stage Group, and the Late Stage Group allow the caregiver to attend the caregiver group while their loved one participates in activities that stimulate their brains. Lisa Thomas, Speech Pathologist, also helps with stimulation. These ladies then started a free dinner following the support group. They developed this social event after the group meetings and it quickly became a hit. This one night a month may be the only night the caregiver and person living with dementia can go out to eat anywhere. This allows these individuals a short break from a very stressful situation.

Kudos to RWC's Long-Serving Staff

Pappahannock Westminster-Canterbury is blessed to have staff that serve the community for many years. We have two staff members, Genita Maiden-Shearin and Lillian George, that have continually served since 1985. Ten employees who started in the first two years have served our community for a total of 324 years combined. A few of those employees decided to broaden their horizons but then returned home to RWC.

At Rappahannock Westminster-Canterbury we value the caring relationships that are developed between staff and residents. We honor and value the gifts, talents and contributions of each staff member who works here. Without their caring service to our residents, we would not have become the community that we are today.

The Small House Project

This year the Small House project moved from dream to reality. With a generous and unexpected \$500,000 donation from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Birdsong, III, and the Birdsong Charitable Foundation, RWC decided to move forward with the project which will bring an amazing residential care setting to residents who will most benefit from supportive care in a home-like environment.

The Small House is a residentially styled, specially equipped home with eight private suites each featuring a sleeping area, living space and a full private bathroom with shower. Residents will likely spend more time enjoying the large, bright activity space, full kitchen and home-like dining area, safe outdoor space, and engaging programming developed by the residents and their specially trained and dedicated team of enablers. The Small House features a service garage for the delivery of supplies, food, and supportive services and full generator power enabling the House to function independently.

The Small House brings this innovative environment and approach to

supportive living and care to residents of RWC and the Northern Neck like no other local care organization currently provides. The potential for improved resident quality of life far

For our fiscal year 2019-2020, our payroll for staff living in the greater Northern Neck community exceeded \$7.9

million with an additional \$1.8 million to staff residing in the Middle Peninsula community.

During the same time period, expenditures on goods, services, and capital assets exceeded \$2.5 million in the Northern Neck and \$174,000 on the Middle Peninsula.

Yes, we do pay taxes as well. Our personal property, real estate and sales tax expenditures were \$193,739 this fiscal year.



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
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
